



Have you ever tried to fit an elephant in your hand? Italian artist Guido Daniele can. Daniele has been nicknamed "Michel-hand-gelo" for painting realistic-looking animals onto human hands. "This is difficult because skin is not flat and still like canvas," Daniele says. "But that's why I also find it interesting." Called "handimals," his designs are inspired by his love for nature and animals. Check out some of the secrets Daniele uses to create these wild handmade creations.
